VL English Literatures Before 1800

This lecture offers an overview of key developments in English literatures before 1800, covering a wide range of different authors and genres. We will cover some of the most influential and compelling literary works before 1800 as well as major trends, concepts, and influences that have shaped English literatures and cultures. Students will be introduced to the various ways in which literary texts build on, respond to, and reflect upon changing cultural, social, and historical contexts. Individual lectures will be organized around selected texts, which will be announced at the beginning of the semester. Please note that this lecture is accompanied by “Case Studies of Selected Texts” (see course catalogue for details), for which students have to enrol separately.

VL Survey of American Literature I

This lecture course provides an overview of U.S.-American literature from its beginnings until the Civil War. We will explore various inventions and formations of “American” and “American literature” during this time of discovery, settlement, upheaval, and national rise to power, examining some of the fundamental ideas, myths, assumptions, intellectual concepts, and popular perceptions that have influenced the ways in which Americans think and write about themselves and their nation. This course is intended to provide an overview of diverse literary traditions across a span of more than four hundred years. Obviously, due to the diversity of American experiences and the amount of time covered in this course, the survey will be relatively cursory. Your *Norton Anthology of American Literature* (two volumes) provides a more expansive selection of literary and cultural expressions from North America and you are encouraged to pursue these sections on your own as a supplement to the texts covered in class.

Einführung in die Wissenskulturen

Wissenskulturen in transdisziplinärer Perspektive (Philosophie, Literaturwissenschaft, Geschichte, GNT), Recherchemöglichkeiten, Institutionen der Wissensvermittlung in Stuttgart, Struktur des Studiengangs. Zur Ergänzung erhalten die Studierenden eine Lektüreliste, die im Selbststudium zu bearbeiten ist.

Die Studierenden bekommen einen Überblick über die spezifischen Aufgabenbereiche und Kompetenzen der beteiligten Fächer und Disziplinen im Hinblick auf den Komplex der Wissenskulturen. Sie lernen die Recherche- und Informationsbeschaffungsmöglichkeiten in Stuttgart kennen und werden mit den relevanten Institutionen der Wissensspeicherung und Wissensdistribution vor Ort vertraut gemacht (z.B. Württembergische Landesbibliothek, Hauptstaatsarchiv, Südwestrundfunk, Haus der Geschichte Baden Württemberg, Deutsches Literaturarchiv Marbach). Es wird in die unterschiedlichen Tätigkeitsbereiche aus dem Bereich „Wissenskulturen“ eingeführt. Die Studierenden sammeln vertiefte Erfahrungen im Transfer von akademischem Wissen zu zielgruppenorientierter Vermittlung.

4. TEXT AND CONTEXT, Text und Kontext

Case Study of Key Texts I: English Literatures Before 1800

This seminar accompanies the weekly lecture course “Text and Context: English Literatures Before 1800,” which provides an overview of English literature from its medieval and Renaissance beginnings up until around 1800. In the smaller Case Study seminar sessions, which will take place every two weeks, students will have the opportunity to engage more thoroughly with the topics and texts introduced in the main lecture course. However, most seminar work will involve discussion and analysis of three literary texts that students will have to read during the semester. The focus will be on improving close reading and interpretive skills. We will also read and use secondary literature in our analysis of key primary texts. All students must attend the first seminar session they have registered for; each seminar group will then be divided into two.

Case Study of Key Texts I: Survey of American Literature I

This course accompanies the lecture course “Survey of American Literature I.” In weekly 45-minute sessions, it will provide students with the opportunity to engage more thoroughly with topics and texts introduced in the main lecture course. The seminar will also serve as a forum for unanswered questions relating to the material covered in the lecture course. Seminar work will focus on the practice of text study and it will aim to help students refine their research and reading skills. Students will acquire additional knowledge on the scholarly debates surrounding some key texts of American literature and will have the chance to develop and discuss their own positions on the texts and the texts’ historical and cultural contexts.

5. HAUPTSEMINARE

Ecologies of Sound: Poetry and Radio

Long before the poetry podcasts in abundance online today, Edna St. Vincent Millay read her work on the airwaves in 1932-33, harnessing the newness of radio at the time to expand poetry's audience, and, thereby, to ultimately make it a more democratic art form. Similarly, this seminar will foreground an auditory, intermedial engagement of poetic texts to initiate a conversation about the democratizing power of poetry in public spaces, like radio broadcasts and poetry jukeboxes. Further, we will examine the Poetry as Commemoration project from University College Dublin (<https://www.poetryascommemoration.ie/>), which draws on archival materials about the Irish War of Independence and Civil War and transforms them into auditory artifacts.

As part of a two-year School for Talents Faculty Project, 'Sensing Sound in Literature-Talents,' this seminar will mentor a year 9 class from Hölderlin-Gymnasium and participate in a two-day workshop in November led by scholars and poets from Ireland (for more information see:

https://www.ilw.uni-stuttgart.de/abteilungen/englische_literaturen/veranstaltungen/sensing-literature-talents/). That is, seminar participants will shift from the role of radio listener to radio broadcaster to make a radio show at HORADS 88.6 (<https://www.horads.de/>) under the guidance of the station manager, Lion Oeding. In this way, participants will follow in the footsteps of many of the Irish and Northern Irish poets we will explore in this course who have not only read their work on the radio, but have worked as radio broadcasters on the BBC or RTÉ, like Seamus Heaney, Paul Muldoon, Eavan Boland, Michael Longley, and Louise MacNeice. Herein, we will apply the model of Paul Muldoon in his 1970s BBC Northern Ireland radio series *Bazaar* to create a radio show that mixes sound clips, poems, short stories, songs, and archival elements that students will write, record, edit, and broadcast. This engagement with radio as 'fieldwork' will, ultimately, offer us a frame to explore how literary texts aesthetically construct, in T.S. Eliot's vernacular, an "auditory imagination" built out of a "feeling for syllable and rhythm" and resulting in an enlargement beyond the first-person singular through a widening lens of mutual receptivity.

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Narratives of Climate Change: A Snapshot of the Anthropocene in the English Novel

In 1997, an international treaty with the goal to limit the emission of seven specific greenhouse gases (GHG) to a level that would “prevent dangerous anthropogenic interference with the climate system” was signed in Kyoto, Japan. The first so-called ‘commitment period’ of the protocol, in which 37 industrialised countries pledged to limit emissions to individually negotiated rates, ran from 2008 to 2012. Since then, some commentators have classified the protocol as a spectacular failure: global GHG emissions have actually grown since 1997. Other commentators, however, have pointed out the huge symbolic significance of the protocol, which highlighted the necessity of international cooperation and collective action, and which put global warming firmly on public agendas. Which is not meant to imply that the impact of human activities on the environment had not been on public agendas before. Indeed, humanity’s relationship with the environment is perhaps one of the oldest topics, if not the oldest topic, in the arts and literature.

Rather than attempting to provide a comprehensive overview of how literature has engaged with the environment throughout the ages, we will examine a very specific snapshot: five novels by English authors, first published right at the start of the Kyoto Protocol’s first commitment period. We will ask how these novels specifically engage with the tension between fact and fiction when read against the backdrop of scientists’ and activists’ increasingly dire warnings about the consequences of inaction on the one hand, and the cries of foul play by climate change deniers and conspiracy theorists on the other.

While the novels in question are published roughly around the same time, and while the authors share the same general geographic and cultural background, they are nevertheless very heterogeneous. If you are interested in attending this seminar, a willingness to engage with a broad range of genres ranging from so-called literary fiction through satire, near future dystopias to hard science fiction is a prerequisite. You should also be prepared to read a number of theoretical and non-fiction texts, resulting in a fairly heavy weekly reading load overall.

Reading for Form

What is form and what does it do? What exactly does “reading for form” mean? Can form be separated from content? What is the role of form in literary studies? Can a study of literary form help us understand, navigate, and maybe even change forms in other areas, for example politics? In this seminar we will tackle these questions and trace their developments from twentieth-century formalism to the recent movement of “new formalism”. We’ll read key texts that problematize the role and importance of form, discuss what form is, what it does, and what a literary approach focusing on form might entail and lack. We’ll apply these approaches to texts by Henry James, Virginia Woolf, and to recent climate fiction.

The American Short Story: Focus 19th Century

In 1837 American philosopher and literary critic Ralph Waldo Emerson delivered an address at Harvard University called “The American Scholar.” It is regarded as America’s declaration of literary independence because it demands a separation from “the courtly muses of Europe.”

The literary genre to respond most strongly to this expectation was the American short story which is also often called a “national art form.” A. Walton Litz states that this “does not mean the greatest short stories have been written by Americans, although our literature can claim more than its fair share, but that the history of the American short story is a faithful record of our literary and social development.”

Our seminar will provide an interpretation and analysis of American short stories throughout the 19th century. We will discuss stories by Irving, Hawthorne and Poe whose literary sketches, ambiguous moral explorations and strict formal guidelines shaped the genre in the first half of the century. We will turn to Melville, Twain, and James, among other authors, who added and refined symbolic, realistic and psychological dimensions to the American short story. We will study short stories by female writers such as Orne Jewett, Wilkens Freeman, Perkins Gilman and Cather who added further literary elements and new perspectives to the American short story at the turn of the century.

In Conversation with Globalization: The Short Run and Long Walk to Sustainability: Germany, India, South Africa, and Italy (Online Course)

This is a course about the effects of globalization in an increasingly interconnected world. It will address various aspects of globalization and explore some of the challenges for societies in a new phase of globalization that is taking shape. Special focus will be on challenges to achieve sustainability. The discussion will take place with regard to Asia (focus on India), Africa (focus on South Africa) and Europe (focus on Germany and Italy). Course topics will take up and evaluate current debates in politics, economy, society, arts and literature.

The online course is offered in cooperation between the University of Stuttgart (Stuttgart, Germany), St. Xavier's College (Mumbai, India), Stellenbosch University (South Africa) and the University of Bergamo (Italy). Participants will study and learn together in a virtual classroom. Throughout the course they will work individually and in international groups.

The course will end with an **international project week in presence in Mumbai, India, in February 2024** (right after the end of seminars at the University of Stuttgart).

Introduction to Film Studies

The field of film studies evolved in the 1970s and developed three major areas of investigation ever since: 1) film history, 2) film theory and 3) film analysis. This compact seminar will introduce each of these areas. It will thereby focus on American film history, film theory (montage and auteur theory) and the analysis (or close reading) of exemplary film sequences (especially openings). The course thus aims at giving an overview of the discipline as well as at providing the necessary analytical tools in order to understand how movies narrate stories and create meaning through the employment of certain stylistic devices (mise-en-scène, cinematography, editing, sound).

Day 1 will focus on film history, especially through the lens of genre (film noir), Hollywood as an industry and the development of film language in early cinema. We will then proceed on Day 2 and 3 with classical film theories and the basics of film analysis with the films of Stanley Kubrick (particularly 2001 – A Space Odyssey), while Day 4 will be devoted to the analysis of opening sequences of films by Alfred Hitchcock (*Rear Window*, *Vertigo* and *Psycho*).

American Documentary Film

One of the first feature-length films that was labelled a ‚documentary‘, *Moana* (1926), was made by an American (Robert J. Flaherty). Ever since, documentary film culture has thrived in America, evolving as a distinct genre and generating different movements and approaches (e.g. experimental avant-garde, direct cinema, autobiographical documentaries). Documentaries have also been used as a propaganda tool (especially during WWII), but mostly conceived as an alternative or even in opposition to mainstream American film production with its center in Hollywood. This course will track the evolution of documentary filmmaking in the US chronologically, charting key films and movements from the early 1920s to today. We will discuss these key films in close (their modes of representation, ethics and production contexts) as well as how they deal with aspects of twentieth and twenty-first century US-American society and politics.

Auditory Culture (HS/FÜSQ)

Conceiving of thinking in terms of seeing, Western tradition has privileged vision and thus relegated the auditory to the status of the second or, to use Daniel Barenboim's phrase, the "neglected" sense. However, ocularcentrism and its "Othering of the auditory" (Jonathan Sterne) has been challenged in the recent years by Sound Studies and by Auditory Culture Studies – emergent interdisciplinary approaches dedicated to the sonic dimension and our perception of it, to the interaction between the acoustic environment and the listeners.

By focusing on the sonic dimension of various literary texts, ranging from Romanticism to the present, this course will examine Sound Studies' and Auditory Culture Studies' theoretical frameworks and key terms, such as noise and silence, man-made and natural soundscapes, histories of listening and of auditory practices, and the impact of the inventing of sound reproduction technologies.

Evil Children in American Literature

The notion of childhood as innocent of pure, and of the child as “little angel” that needs to be shielded from the corrupting impact of the world of adults has dominated Western thought, language, values and educational concepts. Rousseau considered childhood as the “age of nature” and children have been seen as “blank slates.” Nevertheless, literature has been haunted by wicked, corrupted, criminal, and even explicitly evil children who challenge any idealization and sacralization of childhood.

This course will focus on evil children in American Literature: We will inquire into the “innocence” of the child and examine, along with various theories of childhood, the “little angel’s” Other in fictions by Henry James, Shirley Jackson, William March, Thomas Tyron and Lionel Shriver.

Black Postmodernism

Jean-François Lyotard famously defined the postmodern as “incredulity towards metanarratives” with metanarratives being understood as methods of reading both history and epistemology. In this course we will be looking at the history and the development of African American postmodernism, which is to say African American literature that challenges traditional ways of thinking about historiography and what constitutes knowledge. The course will give an overview of the development of African American postmodernism, beginning with its precursors in Black surrealism and the Black occult. We will read texts by Sun Ra, Amiri Baraka, Ishmael Reed, Fran Ross, William Melvin Kelley, among others, while exploring the dimensions of what Black authors have done in this unusual field. Along the way we will develop critical skills for reading the literature using the theoretical prescriptions suggested by writers and theorists who have worked with Black postmodernism.

On the Move: Migration, Literature and Cross-Cultural Encounters

This seminar is primarily designed for candidates who take their final teachers' examination (MEd/GymPO) with the instructor. Other advanced students can register, but enrollment is limited and exam candidates will be prioritized.

This seminar is designed to prepare education majors, who are at least in their third MEd semester, for the oral examination in the (final) module "Literary & Linguistic Competence" and for the *Abiturschwerpunktthema* in Baden-Württemberg beginning in 2025. In the course of the semester, we will explore the social, political, cultural and literary contexts of four authors from the United States, whose work will be read and studied in school: Seffi Atta, Luis Alberto Urrea, Chimamanda N. Adichie, and Jhumpa Lahiri. In addition, we will watch and analyze the movie *Arrival* (in which linguists save the world!) in order to sharpen students' knowledge in film and media studies. Students will also further be familiarized with theoretical concepts such as encounters, diasporic networks, hybridity, the Black Atlantic, and assimilation vs. cultural nationalism in migratory environments.

Punk and Politics in the UK and Beyond

Punk is more than a musical genre. Its aesthetic and cultural reach, since its emergence in the mid-1970s as an aggressive, high-energy form of rock music, has extended into fashion, film, the visual arts, theatre and the performing arts, literature, traditional musical and media genres, as well as zines, blogs, vlogs and other forms of do-it-yourself writerly and readerly production in the contemporary age. Above all, however, punk remains an expression of youthful revolt, rebellion, alienation, and disaffection with the status quo, an impetus for cultural and social change. This course considers punk music as a form of cultural and political expression with a particular focus on the United Kingdom, though we will also look briefly at punk in the USA and Australia. We will study the aesthetics and poetics of 1970s punk and 1980s post-punk, as it sought to reflect, refract and articulate political developments in the UK, from the decline of Labour and the left in the late-1970s to the rise of Margaret Thatcher's Britain in the 1980s. We will read song lyrics, at least three novels, and a range of historical and cultural texts; we will listen to a lot of music, of course, and watch films on 1970s/80s Britain. (Please do not do this course if you think the reading workload will be light!) In addition, an excursion to London – possibly 5-6 days – is being planned for early January 2024, dependent on the receipt of funding to subsidise costs.

Empirical Literary Studies: Short Stories 20th to 21st Century

This seminar is primarily designed for candidates who take their final teachers' examination (MEd/GymPO) with the instructor. Other advanced students are invited to register, but enrollment is limited and exam candidates will be prioritized.

“I sometimes sense that when people talk about short stories the assumption is that the short story is somehow less accomplished than the novel. And I don't think so at all.” (Adichie)

Hence, if we read Nigerian-American author Adichie's acclaimed novel *Americanah* about the experience of migrating back and forth across the Atlantic, what are the effects she achieves by comparison with her short stories?

In this course, we 'time-travel' from the 19th century to the 21st century to find out about the special quality of the genre. First of all, we briefly catch up with the American origins of the genre and E.A. Poe who famously launched his view on how short stories engage readers' minds ('unity of effect and impression'), and then explore how 20th and 21st century writers understand their craft (e.g. Chopin, Hemingway, Silko, Cisneros, Adichie). Along these lines, we trace seminal developments in American literary history.

Meanwhile, we also take a deep dive and put our topic into the perspective of empirical research which probes into readers' subjective reading experience. How is it that short stories create images that will long stay with us even after we have put down the book?

At the same time, our topic offers a great chance for initiating an intense dialogue with EFL experts. Apart from Adichie, we will work with short stories by Jhumpa Lahiri, Luis Alberto Urrea, and Sefi Atta, all clustering around the future A-level topic "On the Move". In this context, we are also looking forward to a workshop on creative methods of reading with an emphasis on the use of drama in education (Silke Franz). In drama-based foreign language teaching, language is experienced and used in a holistic and action-oriented way by creating communication situations that are as authentic as possible. This is not about the acting of a character. What is central is the willingness to take on a different perspective, to explore and try out possibilities for action from within the role, and to reflect on the experiences made.

Colonial American Literature

Students attending this seminar will be encouraged to apply for participating in the *Shakespeare Academy* in the context of the *Frühjahrstagung 2024* of the *Deutsche Shakespeare-Gesellschaft*, Bochum, 19- 21 April 2024, dedicated to *Diversity & Community*. Students will be also invited to participate in the *Studententage* of the *Deutsche Shakespeare-Gesellschaft* in November this year in Stuttgart. *Schauspiel Stuttgart* will open their season with a new production of *Twelfth Night* directed by Burkhard C. Kosminski.

Current Approaches to Shakespeare

This seminar is designed for candidates who take their final teachers' examination (GymPO) with the instructor and advanced students who plan on becoming teachers (MEd 'Literary Competence'). Enrolment is limited and exam candidates will be prioritized.

We will start from the currently most topical and inclusive approach to Shakespeare, namely Shakespeare and diversity, comprising foci on racial, gender, cultural, religious, social, language, and performative diversity. Informed by cognitive literary studies, fields of interest will also be Shakespeare and embodiment, performance and attention, knowledge and the senses. We will also dedicate sessions to Shakespeare and adaptation and to the formation of modern Shakespeare studies through the achievements of new historicist, cultural materialist, postcolonial and gender studies. “I rubbed my eyes a little to see if this sunbeam were no illusion” (R.W. Emerson about Leaves of Grass, letter to Walt Whitman July 21, 1855).

Walt Whitman’s *Leaves of Grass* was a work-in-progress: from 1855 until 1892. It was written, re-written and expanded – so the reading remains a work-in-progress for us, too. From its editing history we’ll move to the development of its peculiar form and come to various formal and thematic approaches to make sense of it in the critical terms of intra- and intertextuality, ecocriticism, politics, philosophy, reader response and gender theory, censorship, and last not least reception history (especially in England), popular culture and intermediality.

This seminar is designed to prepare education majors, who are at least in their third MED semester, for the oral examination in the (final) module "Literary & Linguistic Competence" and for the *Abiturschwerpunktthema* in Baden-Württemberg beginning in 2025. In the course of the semester, we will explore the social, political, cultural and literary contexts of four authors from the United States, whose work will be read and studied in school: Seffi Atta, Luis Alberto Urrea, Chimamanda N. Adichie, and Jhumpa Lahiri. In addition, we will watch and analyze the movie *Arrival* (in which linguists save the world!) in order to sharpen students' knowledge in film and media studies. Students will also further be familiarized with theoretical concepts such as encounters, diasporic networks, hybridity, the Black Atlantic, and assimilation vs. cultural nationalism in migratory environments.

Colloquium for Exam Candidates

Empirical Literary Studies: Short Stories 20th to 21st Century

This seminar is primarily designed for candidates who take their final teachers' examination (MEd/GymPO) with the instructor. Other advanced students are invited to register, but enrollment is limited and exam candidates will be prioritized.

“I sometimes sense that when people talk about short stories the assumption is that the short story is somehow less accomplished than the novel. And I don't think so at all.” (Adichie)

Hence, if we read Nigerian-American author Adichie's acclaimed novel *Americanah* about the experience of migrating back and forth across the Atlantic, what are the effects she achieves by comparison with her short stories?

In this course, we 'time-travel' from the 19th century to the 21st century to find out about the special quality of the genre. First of all, we briefly catch up with the American origins of the genre and E.A. Poe who famously launched his view on how short stories engage readers' minds ('unity of effect and impression'), and then explore how 20th and 21st century writers understand their craft (e.g. Chopin, Hemingway, Silko, Cisneros, Adichie). Along these lines, we trace seminal developments in American literary history.

Meanwhile, we also take a deep dive and put our topic into the perspective of empirical research which probes into readers' subjective reading experience. How is it that short stories create images that will long stay with us even after we have put down the book?

At the same time, our topic offers a great chance for initiating an intense dialogue with EFL experts. Apart from Adichie, we will work with short stories by Jhumpa Lahiri, Luis Alberto Urrea, and Sefi Atta, all clustering around the future A-level topic "On the Move". In this context, we are also looking forward to a workshop on creative methods of reading with an emphasis on the use of drama in education (Silke Franz). In drama-based foreign language teaching, language is experienced and used in a holistic and action-oriented way by creating communication situations that are as authentic as possible. This is not about the acting of a character. What is central is the willingness to take on a different perspective, to explore and try out possibilities for action from within the role, and to reflect on the experiences made.

10. Linguistic Levels

Syntactic Theory

for (A): In this course we will see how syntactic theory can account for the ungrammaticality of sentences like the following:

- (1) *It seems syntax to be fascinating
- (2) *It is reluctant that Martin will do syntax.
- (3) *How do you wonder what we will discuss?

In short, we will discuss all kinds of movement phenomena and empty categories. Moreover, we will be concerned with binding, control, μ , theta and Case theory. Good basic knowledge of syntax is obligatory (based on Introduction to Linguistics).

for (B): This is going to be a hybrid course, i.e. in some weeks there will be in-class sessions and in other weeks, I will upload a video for you to watch at home. The ratio between in-class sessions and videos is about 50/50.

The aim of this seminar is to learn how to think syntactically. After reviewing your syntactic knowledge from previous courses, we will see how we can argue for or against a given syntactic model. We will be looking at how Government and Binding (GB) has dealt with certain syntactic phenomena, and we will then see how these phenomena can be accounted for in a minimalist framework. In detail, we will be dealing with binding, case, the internal structure of the NP, control vs. raising, and with a special emphasis, we will look into the internal make-up of the VP arguing for a more elaborated structure (VP, vP, VoiceP) than so far assumed.

for (C): Syntax is the study of the rules by which words are put together to form more complex expressions, including sentences. This course is an introduction to the basic concepts of syntactic theory, including lexical and syntactic categories, binding theory, phrase structure rules, and case. During the course, we will develop a substantial fragment of the grammar of English while considering linguistic universals. We will work with the textbook by Carnie (2007) "Syntax: A generative Introduction" and exercises.

11. Language & Cognition

for (A): Introduction to psycholinguistics

This course is an introduction to psycholinguistics: In the first part of the course, students are introduced to topics in language acquisition, language comprehension, and language production based on chapters 4-11 from Julie Sedivy's textbook "Language in Mind" (2019/2020, Oxford University Press). In the second part of the course, students carry out a research project in psycholinguistics, to further familiarize them with research methods in psycholinguistics and to give them experience in data collection and data analysis, as well as in how to write up a research report.

Buying the textbook is highly recommended, even though it is quite expensive. If you do not want to buy the textbook: The IB and UB both have at least one copy for use in the library.

Assessment is based on a final exam.

for (B)+(C): Second Language Acquisition

The aim of this seminar is to provide in-depth knowledge concerning second language acquisition (L2A): How does it differ from L1A, which factors may be responsible for more or less successful L2 learning, what do we know about the L2 development of different grammatical aspects (Phonology, Morphology, Syntax)? Closely related areas such as first language acquisition, language teaching, and bilingualism will also be touched upon.

This course is an introduction to psycholinguistics, specifically the topics of language acquisition, language comprehension, and language production. Readings include chapters from Julie Sedivy's "Language in Mind" (2019/2020, Oxford University Press) as well as several original research articles.

12. Advanced Linguistics (B.A./M.A. Level)

Advanced Semantics: Formal analyses of presuppositions

This course introduces students to contemporary analyses of presuppositions. In doing so, this course also serves as an advanced introduction to formal semantics/pragmatics: Students deepen their understanding of first order predicate logic, the lambda calculus, and model-theoretic semantics, and they learn about dynamic semantics, the formal analysis of tense, focus, and interrogatives, as well as at-issueness and the Question Under Discussion.

This course prepares students to conduct research in formal semantics/pragmatics by introducing them to the formal analysis of central concepts in formal semantics/pragmatics. A prerequisite for the course is an introduction to formal semantics/pragmatics, such as the BA-level course “Semantic Theory” offered at the IfLA, or background in predicate logic, first order predicate logic, and the lambda calculus (see chapters 1-6 in https://eecoppock.info/bootcamp/Invitation_to_formal_semantics-2022Jan18.pdf).

Advanced Semantics: Investigating projection variability

This course introduces students to formal and empirical research on projection variability. After briefly reviewing first order predicate logic, the lambda calculus, and model-theoretic semantics (which should be familiar from an introduction to formal semantics/pragmatics), the first part of the course introduces dynamic semantics and the classical analysis of projection in dynamic semantics by Irene Heim. The second part of the course introduces students to theoretical and empirical research on projection variability. In the third part, students learn how to empirically investigate research projects, to be able to carry out their own investigations of projection variability.

A prerequisite for the course is an introduction to formal semantics/pragmatics, such as the BA-level course “Semantic Theory” offered at the IfLA, or background in predicate logic, first order predicate logic, and the lambda calculus (see chapters 1-6 in https://eecoppock.info/bootcamp/Invitation_to_formal_semantics-2022Jan18.pdf).

Assessment is based on several (pass/fail) assignments that are intended to help students build their research project and a final research paper.

Advanced Semantics: Tense and Aspect

In this course, we investigate how natural language expresses the concept of time. We can describe events in the past, the present or the future. However, languages can express much more fine-grained nuances of time, such as the difference between “Nina had won”, “Nina was winning”, and “Nina won”. And why is it that we can say “Nina competed for three hours” but not “Nina won for three hours”?

This course teaches you how to model tense and aspect in language. Based on this, we will read papers on research questions related to tense and aspect, e.g., Do noun phrases have their own time, as in “former president”? or Where do German L2 learners of English have trouble with the English tense-aspect-system?

Advanced Phonology: Loanword Adaptation

In this seminar, we will encounter various types of phonetic/phonological modification that foreign (mostly English) words may undergo when they become integrated into the lexicon of a different language. For example, why is Donald Trump called *Donarudo Toranpu* in Japanese but *Tangnade Telangpu* in Mandarin Chinese? In order to analyze and (possibly) explain such types of modification, we will need to take a closer look at phonetic and phonological properties (segmental and/or suprasegmental) of the borrowing language.

Over the course of the semester, we will discuss chapters and articles but also make active use of examples provided by the members of the seminar, which should enable participants to perform and write up their own analysis of original data in a term paper at the end of the semester. Participants of this course should therefore already come equipped with some background in segmental (vowels, consonants) and suprasegmental (syllable structure, stress) aspects of English and possibly other languages.

Advanced Phonology: Grammatical aspects in Heritage Languages

This advanced course focuses on methodological and grammatical aspects of Heritage Languages and Heritage speakers. Heritage speakers (HSs) are early bilinguals who usually speak one language within their family – the heritage language (HL) – and another language that is the language of the larger society – the majority language (ML).

Heritage language bilingualism has received a great deal of attention over the past two decades for several reasons. First, the number of HSs has risen substantially in recent years to increased global immigration. Thus, the language needs of HSs in their both HL and ML are increasingly salient in the education system. Second, the study of HSs is particularly interesting linguistically because HSs form a unique group of speakers since they are both similar to and different from L1 and L2 speakers.

In this course, we will discuss different methodologies and approaches to study HLs. Furthermore, we will concentrate on the following grammatical aspects of HLs: phonetics and phonology, syntax and information structure.

13. Psycholinguistics (*B.A./M.A. Level*)

Human Sentence Processing

In this graduate-level course, we will delve into the underlying mechanisms of sentence comprehension – how we efficiently and accurately construct meaning from sentences in real-time. We will address the following questions:

1. How do we process a sentence as we read or hear it word by word?
2. What types of knowledge are involved in this process?
3. How do we integrate and resolve conflicting information?

We will examine both classic and contemporary research papers in the sentence comprehension literature, which will cover a variety of perspectives on these questions. Furthermore, we will explore the experimental methodologies utilized in this field, discussing their strengths and limitations.

Throughout the course, students will develop key skills, including:

- A critical approach to reading academic literature
- The ability to effectively communicate complex ideas
- The ability to develop and conduct an experimental study

Learning outcomes

- Knowledge of experimental research on human sentence processing and theories of sentence processing.
- Ability to critically read and evaluate academic literature.
- Ability to present academic content and ideas effectively.
- Preparation for courses on experimental methods such as eye-tracking, statistics, cognitive modeling, computational corpus methods.
- Preparation for an experimental thesis project.

Introduction to Bayesian Data Analysis and Causal Inference in R

This graduate-level course introduces students to the basic concepts and skills needed to conduct serious data analyses in the Bayesian inference framework. In one stream, students will be familiarized with the core ideas of Bayesian causal inference. In a second parallel stream, students will learn how to use the R programming language to read, manipulate, and visualize data. Overall, students will learn essential statistical concepts and methodologies, as well as gain hands-on experience with data analysis tools and techniques in R.

Throughout the course, students will explore the following topics:

1. Overview of the Bayesian framework and its applications to data analysis
2. Regression analysis, including linear and logistic regression models
3. Introduction to the R programming language
4. Data preprocessing, data visualization, and descriptive statistics in R
5. Hypothesis testing, variable selection, data modeling

Current Approaches in Literatures, Cultures and Linguistics

This will enable them to get a deep insight into emerging research areas and identify as well as contextualise their own research interests in close cooperation with lecturers from both areas, linguistics as well as literary and cultural studies.

Selected approaches of the disciplines involved will be deepened in the accompanying seminars, which focus on Linguistics or Literary and Cultural Studies respectively and offer an arena to further explore latest research approaches in the respective fields.

Please note that this lecture is part of the Module “Current Approaches”, which consists of the lecture (2 SWS), and a seminar, which students need to enrol for separately. Thereby they can choose between a seminar (2 SWS) in *either* Current Methodologies in Literatures and Cultures *or* Current Methodologies in Linguistics (see seminar descriptions for details).

Academic Writing (for International MA students)

17. Translation & Verbal Communication

Advanced Academic Discourse / Advanced Verbal Communication

for (A+B): This course is about grammar: teaching it and using it. We will first spend roughly the first third of the course discussing teaching methods and evaluating lesson plans for use in a school setting. The remainder of the course will be made up of teaching sessions in which the students will teach a grammar topic. Grades will be determined based on the students' performance in the teaching session and lesson plan.

for (C): This course is devoted to a hands-on approach to polishing your language skills and literature instruction in a foreign-language classroom. Relying on the pragmatic, rhetorical strategies of effective public communication, the main focus of the course will be to refine your persuasive presentation skills, in oral and written form. You will learn how to web your speaking acumen to your ability to engage analytically and pedagogically with the short-story cycle *The Last Resort* (2021) from the Northern Irish writer Jan Carson, originally commissioned as a 10-episode series for BBC Radio 4 ([http://\(https://www.bbc.co.uk/programmes/m000qxmm\)](http://(https://www.bbc.co.uk/programmes/m000qxmm))) during the lockdown. We will pay particular attention to the function and experience of medial borders in both the typographic representation of the short story cycle and its theatrical, radio performance of a variety of Northern Irish accents. Then, we will jointly construct an instructional resource about the short story cycle and the radio series, taking into account the effects of linguistic bordering in Northern Ireland in this 25th anniversary year of the 1998 Good Friday Agreement.

for (D): In this course, students will learn the approaches required for teaching and using grammar in the classroom, modes of literature instruction, as well as developing language and communication skills for practical use. Students will learn how to hone their oral presentation skills through the ability to engage analytically and pedagogically with two short stories – Ernest Hemingway's 'Hills Like White Elephants' and Shirley Jackson's 'The Lottery'. The course structure will be split by first discussing teaching methods and evaluating lesson plans for use in a school setting during the early part of the semester. Thereafter, the remainder of the course will offer students the opportunity to teach a grammar/literature topic from those introduced in the course materials. Grades will be determined based on the students' performance in the teaching session and lesson plan.

Play-Reading WS 2022/23

Students of English literature are encouraged to attend sessions of the group where we read plays by English or American dramatists through at one sitting. This is an excellent opportunity to get to know a variety of works, including some of the most up-to-date performances. Since theatres in New York and London have resumed staging new productions, it is about time taking a closer look on new plays which recently had a strong impact on critics and audiences alike.

The first three plays we are going to read are about dramatic encounters which portray battles between massive egos and their political or artistic views of the world. In Shomit Dutta's play *Stumped* (2023) we come face to face with Samuel Beckett and Harold Pinter, two dramatists who had won the Nobel prize in literature, as two cricket-obsessed batsmen waiting so-to-speak for their turn. Jack Thorne's *The Motive and the Cue* (2023) brings actor and director John Gielgud and Richard Burton together in a Broadway production of Hamlet in 1964 where both defend their distinctly different ideas about Shakespeare. John Gielgud's star is fading, whereas Burton's stardom is on the rise having recently married Elizabeth Taylor. In *Best of Enemies* (2021) James Graham depicts the unbridgeable gulfs between conservative and liberal America that still endure personified by two mutually detesting American essayists in TV debates: on the New Right there is William F. Buckley Jr and, opposite on the New Left sits Gore Vidal.

The other three plays concerned take a critical look at recent developments in society. *The Minutes* by Tracy Letts (2022) portrays a city council meeting in 'Big Cherry', somewhere in the US. In a quite surreal way Letts shows us complacent, petty bureaucrats and how they react when historical stories of the past, serving as a source of social identity, are called into question. In this year's Pulitzer Prize winning play *English* (2023) by Sanaz Toossi we meet four students and their language teacher in Iran prepping for the Test of English as a Foreign Language in 2008. The play illustrates how linguistic struggles also become a struggle for a 'new' or 'second' identity. Tom Fowler's new satire *Hope Has a Happy Meal* (2023) has as its central character Hope who tries to survive in a world of dwindling resources, corruption and corporate giants.

Students of all semesters are welcome to our 'online' reading sessions, either to read or to listen. Readings will be primarily on alternate Thursdays, beginning punctually at 7 p.m. The detailed programme will outline the dates of our meetings and how to get a certificate. It will be available at the **introductory meeting on Thursday October 26th, also again at 7 p.m.!!!**

Fachdidaktik Englisch I (Erster Teil)

This first module of 'Fachdidaktik Englisch' consists of two parts. Part 1 runs in the winter term and part 2 in the summer term. With its two parts, this module is designed to prepare university students for their first experience of teaching English at school ('Gymnasium' or 'Gemeinschaftsschule'). It offers a systematic introduction to seminal theories of foreign language learning and teaching with respective state-of-the-art strategies and methods on the basis of up-to-date research.

After the completion of module parts 1 and 2, the university students will be competent to apply these theories and methods of teaching English as a foreign language to the needs both of whole classes and of individual learners, depending on the learners' levels and on the aims set by the curriculum. To prepare the students for their first practical teaching experience, this module will put a special focus on lesson design and lesson simulation with subsequent reflection. In the course of the module participants will find that what they have studied so far in the fields of linguistics and both literary and cultural theory will come in handy as there are multiple fruitful cross-references between these disciplines and 'Englisch Fachdidaktik I'.
