PS Basic Phonetics and Phonology I

Matthias JILKA**MO 14.00 – 15.30****Raum 2.00**

The class introduces students to the areas of Phonetics and Phonology by explaining the relationship between the two disciplines and thus between phones and phonemes. The description of phonetic features will be extended into a detailed look at Articulatory Phonetics (i.e. the functions of speech organs in producing speech sounds). On this basis the sound systems of a standard British (RP) and American (GA) pronunciation will be covered in theory and practice (pronunciation and transcription). Finally, the basic principles of Generative Phonology will be introduced as well.

The described parameters are related to concrete examples and a detailed overview of the major varieties and dialects of English is given (involving a more practical approach).

In this course we will see how syntactic theory can account for the ungrammaticality of sentences like the following:

- (1) *It seems syntax to be fascinating
- (2) *I try Martin to read the syntax book.
- (3) *Who do you think that will pass the test?
- (4) *How do you wonder what we will discuss?

In short, we will be concerned with all kinds of movement phenomena, Case & control theory, and empty categories. Finally, we will try to catch up with current syntactic research and discuss the core ideas of Minimalism. Good basic knowledge of syntax is obligatory.

HS Advanced Syntax: Theories of Raising and Control

Credits: 7	Pre-requisites: solid knowledge of Syntax (G4 level) Requirements: Assignments and term paper	BA-Leistungspunkte Anglistik: 6
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Artemis ALEXIADOU**DO 11.30 – 13.00****Raum 7.207**

This is a theoretical syntax class that focuses on A-dependencies, by paying special attention to the phenomena of Raising and Control. After reviewing the standard theory, according to which Control structures involve PRO, while Raising structures involve movement, the course will discuss more recent minimalist approaches to this distinction. In particular, under the view that Control also involves Movement (Hornstein 1999 and subsequent work), the difference between Control and Raising becomes less clear (the two constructions differ only in theta theoretic terms).

- (1) a. [TP Bill [VP Bill tried [IP Bill to [VP Bill cut the line]]]] *Subject Control*
 b. [TP Bill [VP (Bill) seem [IP-Bill to [VP Bill cut the line]]]] *Subject Raising*

In addition, the Copy and delete theory of movement, adopted in Minimalist Syntax (Chomsky 1995 and subsequent work) leads to the picture in (2) and the typology of dependencies in (3). The course will be concerned with describing and deriving this typology:

HS Verb Classes

This course is devoted to describing verbs as members of classes that denote events, processes, states or phases of these and the variability that is connected with this classification. We will be concerned with various theoretical approaches to this distinction, the ultimate goal being to present a syntactic theory of verb classes.

People who speak more than one language may often switch language in the middle of the conversation. This is often referred to as "Code-Switching". This course will discuss the phenomenon of code switching from a variety of perspectives in attempt to determine the reasons why it arises and offer a theoretical explanation to the patterns it follows.

HS Theories of case and the syntax-morphology interface

Case is essentially a morphological category, but its determination is closely tied in with syntactic relations and processes. How we decide to treat case thus depends quite heavily on our broader theories of each component and especially on our understanding of the syntax-morphology interface. In this seminar we will look at a number of different theories which differ sometimes radically in how they divide the work between the two components, attempt to evaluate how well they account for the data and see what consequences arise for linguistic theory.

HS Topics in Human Language Processing

This is a course in the field of psycholinguistics: the study of language production, comprehension and acquisition. Central issues in language processing are covered with an emphasis on how theories in linguistics inform processing models and how findings from processing experiments can inform linguistic theory. The primary focus is going to be on comprehension, including an introduction to the biological basis of language capacity in the brain. After introducing basic issues and looking at different models for processing we will also look at real life examples of processing experiments and what we can learn from them. Language acquisition will only be touched upon briefly.

In this course we will consider foreign accent in English from the viewpoints of both didactics and practice. In the didactic part we will look at how second language pronunciation is being acquired, what problems can be encountered and which methods of training work best. The practical part will provide a brief overview of the major approaches to intonation research, coupled with systematic training in the identification of rhythmic structure and in intonation labelling. A special emphasis will be laid on the comparison of German and English intonation and reduction of speech errors in that respect.

Some of the special features treated: sound changes, morphological changes, the loss of lexical case, the change wrt word-order, modals and negation.
